





#### OUR SCHOOLS, January, 2017

Happy New Year to one and all! It certainly has been a "white and wonderful" start to the new year, well, some may only agree to the "white", not so much to the "wonderful" term. Already this year, we have had two days of school closure due to the bad weather and road conditions. Added to the four days that were missed earlier in December, due to mostly the same circumstances (one day being closed due to heating repairs in the Junior-Senior High School building), there have been six (6) days lost altogether this current school year. Two questions that have been asked the most and that I will try and provide an explanation for are the following:

#### Question #1:

#### With the amount of school closures we have had this school year, when do students and staff have to make up days in the summer to make up for this lost time?

The Idaho State Department of Education requires that all districts have a minimum amount of instructional hours that each student at each grade level is to receive. These are:

- ♦ Kindergarten 450 hours
- Grades 1-3 810 hours
- Grades 4-8 900 hours
- ♦ Grades 9-11 990 hours
- ♦ Grade 12 979 hours

On our district's instructional calendar, we meet these minimums and more. So although we have closed school for six days (up to now), students and staff will not need to make up this time. We can lose, in essence, two more days and still will be able to meet our instructional hours, as required by the State of Idaho.

#### Question #2:

#### How do you determine that the roads are bad, due to the weather, and a school closure is warranted? What is your notification procedure?

It truly does come down to the safety of our students and the bus drivers. As superintendent, I have been empowered by the Board of Trustees to make this decision in cancelling the school day. It is not an arbitrary decision. I require Jerry Schwartzman, Transportation Supervisor, to go out and check our bus route roads and be in touch with our Latah County road crews, to get a feel on what our decision may need to be. Once contacted and assessed of the road conditions, I will make the decision to call off a school day or not. Once that decision has been made, I contact building administrators and department heads, who will then start their "phone trees" contacting our staff. As for communication to our students, parents, and general community, I then contact television stations, radio stations, post it on our website, post it on our emergency alert notice on our phone app., and ask Shirley Ackerman, Zone 5 Trustee, to place it up on Facebook.

Hopefully, we will not have to face more school closures this school year. But if we do, this is how we make our instructional decisions, as well as the procedure we follow to make these school closures happen.







#### **OUR SCHOOLS**

The past four years we have run our Supplemental Levy in the month of March. We will continue down that path this year as well and will be asking voters to vote on our annual supplemental levy on the county election day of Tuesday, March 14. Sometimes it's difficult to keep straight what each levy is about and what the monies go for. So, simply defined, our supplemental levy assists us with the day-to-day operational costs that are needed to run the District. The following are the areas that our supplemental levy provides support for:

- Daily utility costs. ٠
- ٠ Transportation costs.
- Food service support. ٠
- Facility maintenance, upkeep, and repair projects. ٠
- Salaries and benefits for staff. ٠
- ٠ Supplies and materials for instruction.
- Technology infrastructure and upgrades. ٠
- Building security. ٠

As you are all aware, the School Board and I have shared, over the last 2 to 3 years, our sense of urgency to build a new Junior-Senior High School, due to the failing systems in the current building. After the failure of the Building Bond Levy to pass last May and after seeing the overwhelming numbers of "no" votes cast that day, it was apparent that more work and information needed to be completed before we could run a bond levy again. Although we will continue to plan for this option, we will not be running a bond levy for a new school anytime soon.

However, the problems that existed before in our facilities continue to exist today. We have to address them this coming school year - this is a must! These projects will include replacement of our heating system (HVAC units and ductwork) at the Junior-Senior High School and upgrading our electrical system and capacity at both the Elementary and Junior-Senior High School. These projects will be expensive. We will utilize the majority of our Fund Balance to pay for these costs but this may still not be enough to cover the costs so the Board and I are asking to raise the supplemental levy quite significantly in order to meet this demand. The levy amount being asked for is \$1,900,000, an increase of \$510,000 (currently we are at \$1,390,000).

Understanding the District's needs and what we are hoping to accomplish by asking for this amount cannot be fully addressed in this format so we are providing two informational community forums that will provide you with more extensive information, as well as allow you the opportunity to address questions to both our Board members and myself. Please plan to attend either one or both of these events. They will be at the Junior-Senior High School Gym from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. on Thursday, March 2 and Tuesday, March 7.

I would like to share that this year three Board Zone positions are up for election. This election will be on Tuesday, May 16. The three zones that will be up will be Zone 1, Zone 3, and Zone 5. If you live in one of those zones and are interested in being a candidate for your zone, the last day for filing with the county is March 17, by 5:00 p.m. If you need further information or candidacy forms, please go to our district website www.psd285.org - or visit the District Office. We will be glad to assist you with this process.

#### **Dear Community Members**,


Members of Let's Get It Started worked for many years to provide a safe and secure environment for our Potlatch students. After many years of fundraising, the Potlatch Landing Community Center came into existence. The Landing has hosted an average of 10 kids per open day and has been rented out for birthday parties, family reunions, school functions, church studies, and more. The Landing has been maintained on a small budget with much donated help and services.

In 2016, a grant was written to house students at the Landing in an afterschool program modeled by the successful 21st Century Elementary School program. The hope was to keep people in the Landing engaged in the activities held there and create a true community hub for the afterschool program and the community.

Through a series of events, the Landing was never considered as a site for the afterschool program after the 21st Century 7-12 grant was awarded. For the last several months the LGIS board has fought tirelessly to bring the vision to the Landing. During this time, the LGIS board submitted their annually awarded report and grant request to the Recreation District to ask for continued support and funding - funds that would keep the Landing open and potentially house the after school program. We have been told that the Potlatch Recreation District committee allocated only enough monies to pay the rent for the Potlatch Landing. Although appreciated, that offer is not enough to keep the doors open. Building issues caused us to close our doors the end of January and unfortunately, lack of funding will keep them closed.

We are disappointed and exhausted. As such, all items inside the Landing will need to be sold and removed by February 26. We will be posting items for sale on Facebook and other social media sites. Please contact Kathi, Jen, Julie or Debi if you are interested in any item and we will post more information as time permits. Monies raised will go towards our existing and future programs sponsored by Let's Get It Started.

#### 2017 Call for Public Art: Moscow Public Library

The City of Moscow; the Moscow Arts Commission; and the Latah County Library District are seeking submissions for the Moscow Public Library - Call for Public Art.

#### Deadline for submissions is Wednesday, May 3, 2017 by 5:00 p.m.

#### SITE DESCRIPTION

In June 1904 the members of the Pleiades Club and the Ladies Historical Club obtained a grant from philanthropist Andrew Carnegie to construct a free public library in Moscow. The Spanish Mission-style building was designed by Boise architect, Watson Vernon, and the library was completed in March 1906. An addition on the north side of the library was opened in January 1983. The Carnegie portion of the library building is on the National Register of Historic Places. Its most striking feature is the gable style with its graceful curves protruding above the roofline. The tile roof is unusual in this climate. Originally the entrance was approached by a curving stairway on either side. The current public entrance is in the newer part of the library. In 2013 the entrance was renovated, replacing the crumbling steps and adding an ADA-compliant ramp and a plaza area for outdoor public seating as well as group programs. New railings and darksky-friendly exterior lights were installed. Waterwise and native landscaping was planted to conserve water and attract pollinators, introducing an educational element into the library grounds. Today the Moscow Public Library is the headquarters of the Latah County Library District, which has six additional branch libraries throughout the county. The Moscow Public Library serves residents of all ages from area communities as well as the University of Idaho campus.

#### **DESIGN OBJECTIVE**

The desired outcome for this public art project is innovative one-ofa-kind work that visually activates this City of Moscow Library entrance and generates high visibility. The work should be of a scale that achieves volume and/or verticality to assure a strong presence. Secondarily, the artwork should inspire daily passersby and bicyclists, enhancing their experience of the library as a place to pause.

#### **ARTWORK PARAMETERS**

The design may be a single piece or several thematic-related elements. The work may be either freestanding or integrated into the existing concrete seating wall and/or pathways. All freestanding artwork must be set back from the sidewalk by ten feet (10'). Artists should consider this a permanent work of art, designed and engineered to be stable and durable for a minimum of thirty (30) years. Any medium appropriate for exterior siting will be considered. The artwork will need to withstand extreme changes in weather conditions. Of critical importance is the need for consideration of public safety, graffiti and stain resistance, and low maintenance.

#### BUDGET

The budget specified for the project is a not-to-exceed amount of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000). This not-to-exceed amount must cover all costs for design work, engineering, fabrication, transportation, delivery, site preparation and installation, as well as insurance, artist's fee, travel expenses-everything.

Even though the inclement weather that we have had this past winter has been a major challenge for the district and the community, nothing has been more of a challenge for this district than the passing of our annual Supplemental Levy. I cannot stress enough the importance of our supplemental levy and what it pays for in our district. So I thank the community in showing their support for our students and our schools. Although it wasn't an overwhelming amount of approval, it was <u>still</u> approval. For that I am grateful.

Upcoming This May, voters in Zone 5 will be asked to vote for a new School Board Trustee to represent their zone. Mrs. Shirley Ackerman will be stepping down and vacating this position after years of service to her zone, the school district, and the students of Potlatch. Please take the time to thank Shirley for the time that she devoted to serving on the Board of Trustees.

Two candidates will be vying for the vacated position. They are Mr. Ty Winther and Mr. John Carpenter. Two other zones, Zone 1 and Zone 3, trustees are up for reelection as well. However, just a little different scenario than what is taking place in Zone 5. Mrs. Keri LeForce has applied to run for her second term on the School Board and will be running unopposed for Zone 1.

Zone 3 (the town of Potlatch) does not currently have a candidate declaring to run. This zone is currently being represented by Mr. Jeff Stolz. However, Jeff will need to step down when his term ends at the end of June. Jeff does not live in Zone 3 and therefore cannot, by Idaho Code, run for a vacant board position in a zone that he does not reside in. Jeff was appointed by the then current Potlatch School Board to fill the vacancy since there was no interest by anyone in Zone 3. The same thing could occur this summer as well. If there is no interest by a person in Zone 3 to fill the Trustee position, interested patrons who live in other zones throughout the district can apply to fill the vacancy and interview with the Board. The Board will then be able to select the candidate of their choice, in order to fill the vacant position.

As you can see, it is quite a process to fill a vacated Board Trustee position. However, if you, or someone you know, would like to serve on the Board but would like further information, please contact our District Office or contact one of our current Board members. Thank you.



#### **OUR SCHOOLS** April/May 2017

As I write this month's update to the CIA, I can't help<u>not</u> thinking of the phrase, "*April showers bring May flowers*", since it is pouring rain outside my window. It certainly has been a snow-filled winter, as well as a wet, wet Spring. All of this moisture has been needed but it will be nice to see the sunshine come out on a daily basis once again!

With May coming upon us, I want to remind folks that there is an election date in May. On Tuesday, May 16, there will be an election in Zone 5 to choose a new Board Trustee for that zone. Only residents in this zone can cast a vote for the candidate of their choice. The two individuals vying for this Trustee position are Ty Winther and John Carpenter. In Zone 3, we had no candidates for the vacant Trustee position; therefore, the position will be open to <u>any and all</u> residents in the Potlatch School District, no matter what zone you reside in. This will not be an elected position, the candidate of choice will be chosen by the current Board of Trustees to fill the vacant position. If you, or someone you know, may be interested in filling this position, they or yourself, can go to the District's website for instructions on applying for candidacy (<u>www.psd285.org</u>) **or** contact the District Office directly for assistance.

It's important to inform you that, although we are not moving forward yet with plans to run a Bond this year or build a new junior-senior high school immediately, school administration and the Board have not been idle in working towards answers to our current facility concerns. We have been looking at solutions to the complicated heating issues at the Junior-Senior High School, talking to area experts about our particular needs. At the request of the Board of Trustees, we advertised and placed notice for interested heating companies to send us their qualifications, in the hope that we can bring heating experts on board to help us solve our issues at the Junior-Senior High School, giving us viable options that will allow us to upgrade to a more reliable, energy efficient, and cost-effective heating system.

Lastly, I wanted to share the exciting news that in March, our district was chosen to be a partner with five (5) other schools throughout the state, to be part of the **SOAR** Grant Program. The acronym **SOAR** stands for "*Support, Opportunity, Achievement, Revitalization*". This program will look at school improvement and school success. The program is a three (3) year, \$750,000 grant and is a joint collaborative effort between the University of Idaho and Boise State University. The funding of this program comes from the efforts of the Idaho State Board of Education. I am truly honored that we will have this opportunity to involve our school district in this cutting-edge project. I will report more on this project in future editions of the CIA, as well as share information on our district website. Stay tuned!

### Potlatch 7-12 After School Program

We are nearing the end of another school year for the Potlatch School District and the end of the first year for the Potlatch 7 -12 After School Program. It has been an eventful year for the after-school program with many highs and lows, but through it all we are remaining positive and moving forward.

If you haven't heard by now, we are under new management. In March, we saw Melissa Smith take over as director of the program with Bridget Bailey assuming the role of assistant director. Also during March, we saw two of our paraprofessionals move on to new opportunities outside of the program, and we have re-filled one of the two positions with Shannon Mitchell who started in early April.

Our program enrollment numbers remain low, but we have been working hard to promote and advertise the program to encourage more students to participate in this great opportunity. For instance, did you know:

- We offer homework help and tutoring during the program. Each day we have a teacher on hand to provide assistance for any subject a student might be struggling with.
- Each day includes free time, homework time, and an activity. The program starts right after school with a snack and pick up/release time is by 6:00 p.m. Monday-Thursday.
- Students are not required to attend the program every day for the entire daily session. If your student needs to leave early or show up late, or if they can only attend certain days of the week, we can work with their after-school schedule.
- We provide a safe, enriching place for students to hang out before and after practice or club meetings. Any student who signs up is welcome to stop by and do homework or participate in that day's activity before or after practice.
- We provide transportation after the program. A bus picks up students in the program at 6:00 p.m. at the high school and will drop them off at the Potlatch Y, Princeton Community Center, or Harvard Park.
- **Students are exposed to a variety of character, career, and enrichment activities.** Program events in April included a first aid class with Debi Swinney at the Potlatch Fire Department, fitness and nutrition classes with Nancy Smith, mural painting with Karen Rohn, and a short course on the history and culture of Mexico culminating with a Family Night Fiesta Celebration Dinner on April 25.
- **Everything in the program is provided FREE of charge to the students and their families.** This opportunity is open to ALL students in grades 7-12 in Potlatch School District #285, whether they attend Potlatch Junior/Senior High School or are being home schooled. *All that we require is a completed and signed registration form for each student in the program.*


We will also be filling the Vocational Ag. Science position as well. The District would like to thank Mr. Greg McCoy for being a great support as an emergency teacher this past year in this position.

Do you want to learn **PRESERVE** how to safely can, dry or freeze your garden's bounty? University of University of Idaho Extension Idaho Extension invites you to enroll in

Preserve@Home, an online food preservation class to teach individuals how to safely preserve a variety of food products. Participants learn how to produce high-quality, preserved foods and the science behind food preservation and food safety.

The registration deadline is Monday, June 5, 2017. The first lesson of the 6-week course opens online on Thursday, June 8 at 1 pm MDT. Each lesson includes online text (that can be downloaded and printed), online bulletin board to facilitate participant discussion, and a real-time weekly chat to interact with classmates and instructors. The weekly online chat session for the first lesson will be on Thursday, June 15 from 1:00 to 1:45 p.m. MDT. Topics to be covered include: Foodborne Illness - causes and prevention, Spoilage and Canning Basics, Canning High Acid Foods, Canning Specialty High Acid Foods – pickles, salsa, jams, jellies, etc., Canning Low Acid Foods, and Freezing and Drying. Supplemental materials will include materials on planting varieties for food preservation, cold storage and root cellaring.

#### **OUR SCHOOLS-July/August**

I believe summer has arrived!! Wow!!! We have sure had some "scorchers" this past month and we can bank on a few more before school starts up again. Speaking of heat, we have started on our main summer project – the construction of the new heating system at the Junior-Senior High School. Demo work began on the junior high side of the building on July 17. The scope of the project will consist of putting in a new heat pump system which will provide both heating and cooling for the building. This will be added first to the junior high and then extend throughout the high school classrooms, the hallways, the multi-purpose room, bathrooms, and the office area. The ceiling will be lowered in order to put in a T-Bar system to accommodate the heating/cooling units. Included in this project will be the removal of our current lighting fixtures. They will be replaced by new, recessed lighting that will provide a great aesthetic feel, as well as improved lighting for the classrooms and hallways.

This project is more than a summer project. It is scheduled to be completed in approximately 4 months, which will require some creative routing of students throughout the school during the school day. The classrooms are expected to be completed prior to the start of the new school year (Monday, August 28th) so students and teachers should not have to expect interruptions to their classes.

A couple of important information items that I would like for all to be aware of:

The Potlatch School Board of Trustees is seeking letters of interest and resumes from persons who wish to be considered for appointment to the vacant **Zone 3 Trustee** position. Zone 3 covers primarily the area within the city of Potlatch. Items to be further aware of:

The deadline for turning in documents for the vacancy will be 4:00 p.m. on Monday, October 9, 2017.

Qualified applicants must be a school district elector of Potlatch School District and be a resident within Zone 3. Interested candidates may confirm the Zone of their residence by viewing zone maps located on our district website, by coming into the district office and viewing the posted zone maps, or contacting the district office and ask for clarification.

The person appointed by the Board to fill this vacancy will serve a complete 4-Year term as stated in Idaho Code 33-504.

#### 2. Notice of Fee Increase







In this case, it's the starting date of school moving from Monday, August 28th to Monday, September 18th. Due to setbacks on the construction project at the Junior-Senior High School caused by delays in shipment of materials from manufacturers back east and the unforeseen problems associated with the firewall system located in the ceiling of the school, I made the recommendation to our Board of Trustees to delay school till September 18<sup>th</sup>. Although the delay of three weeks seems like a long ways off, it made good sense for several reasons. Those reasons are:

The additional time will allow construction work to continue and be completed within the classrooms and hallways without interfering with the instructional day. If all goes right, they should be out of those particular areas by the  $18^{\text{th}}$ .

By starting on the 18<sup>th</sup>, the Latah County Fair will have come and gone. Typically, between our 4 local FFA and 4H programs, we lose 50 to 75 kids who are involved showing projects at the Fair, not to mention the students we lose who are family members or friends who go attend the Fair as well. The later start allows for all of our students to start school with just school to focus on school with no interruptions until November.

Several questions were taken into consideration before this decision was made. These questions included:

By starting so late into September, won't that mean that students and staff will go late into June before they are out of school? Answer: No. Teachers and administration sat down and worked out class schedules that incorporated adding approximately 20 minutes more daily to the school day, both at the Elementary and at the Junior-Senior High School. This increase of time for a full school year allowed the calendar to remain relatively intact and the end of the school year remains June 1<sup>st</sup>.

What happens to students involved in Fall sports and their seasons?

Answer: No changes. The schedule, both for practices and for games will remain the same. Games in the gymnasium may require family, friends, and fans to come through a different entranceway if the Multi-Purpose Room is not completed on time and bathrooms & concessions may be outside the gym for a short while.

Won't bus routes and time be affected?

Answer: Not much. Starting times for both schools are relatively the same. The difference will be in the afternoon when kids will be returning home. As mentioned, it will be about a 20-minute difference in returning home as compared to previous years.




Just a reminder of what we offer in the Program:

#### EQUIFAX CREDIT BUREAU HACKED

For those that don't know, Equifax, one of our three main credit reporting bureaus, was hacked and over 143 million credit-using Americans are now potentially at risk for identity theft. OK... with that said, we have always all been "potentially at risk" for identity theft. All of this information is already out there. We give the information freely whenever we apply for credit. The challenge here is that it is now in a nice little bundle for the bad guys. So what do we do to make their job harder:

- 1. You can go on-line to <u>www.equifaxsecurity2017.com</u> and sign up for a year's free credit monitoring protection or other reputable credit monitoring service. There will most likely be ones popping up that aren't. This won't fix it all and they are super backed up at this point. Remember, this breach happened early summer so our data has been out there a while, and could already have been used. But this service will monitor the "dark web" where things are sold for purposes other than good.
- 2. Next or first, pull your credit reports and monitor all of your bank statements, credit statements, watch for weird financial activity (credit cards and bills coming in the mail that you didn't ask for, address changes when you didn't move, etc.), and file early for income taxes (income taxes don't show up on any financial record so they are a great target you don't know you have been targeted until you try to file for your tax return and find out "you" already have). "Sometimes identity thieves file tax returns using your Social Security number and claim fraudulent refunds. The IRS has been stepping up enforcement and safeguards against this crime. One recommendation for this year is to file early, and in the meantime, pay attention to any mail from the IRS. Remember that they will never demand information from you over the phone." (<u>http://www.chicagotribune.com/business/</u>)

This breach has now made us all targets for years to come. One year of identity protection isn't going to do it. If folks believe they are a target of identity theft, they can get all of their credit reports for free (if they already pulled their reports for the year, identity theft gives you another one for free and even if you don't get one for free, buy it). If you see something weird, you need to report it immediately. This is true for your kids too. Monitor your kids reports just like you would yours. There are resources to help you in the attached packet that will help you with minor requests.

3. Next, consider putting credit freezes on all of your credit bureau accounts. I have attached three things: the identity theft packet (what to do to protect yourself and how to report it if you have been attacked), a document on how to place freezes on your accounts, and another on the pros and cons of freezes.

Let me explain freezes a bit. If you aren't planning to make any new credit purchases, (this doesn't affect existing open accounts) place a freeze on each of your credit bureau reports. What this does is prevent new credit from being issued. This doesn't mean you are safe but identity thieves like quick and easy. They want to get in and get out. They are not going to spend a lot of time on someone's account that is being proactive. They are going to go for the ones that haven't checked their reports for 20 years and haven't done anything to safeguard what they have. You will want to take care of kids accounts too.


In Idaho and Washington, if you are a victim of identity theft, you can freeze your accounts for free (in Washington, 65 and older can always freeze for free). If you just want to protect yourself, the cost is \$6 (\$10 a piece in WA) to freeze and thaw the account. So for a family of 4, you are looking at \$96 to freeze all four bureaus (read the handout on freezes. There is another credit agency out there too. This seems a bit high but if it keeps you from racking up 100s of 1000s, it will be worth it.

4. And, you can also place a fraud alert on their credit bureau accounts so that the credit bureau stops and asks before allowing. These only last 90 days so you will have to keep activating or actually be a victim and start the process. I would probably save this for last unless you notice actual weird activity in your account.

This is something that we are going to have to watch for a long time. If we make it harder for them to use our information that they already have, they should move on to the next. Freezing and fraud alerts, making sure that you balance and are aware of your finances every month, this is what we need to be doing anyway.

Share the copies of all of these documents with friends. Let me know if you have questions. The best form of attack is to be proactive. It is your financial life. Make sure that you protect it.

#### OUR SCHOOLS—September/October 2017

FINALLY! The school year has arrived!! With the school year delayed by the construction project at the Junior-Senior High School for nearly a month, school doors and classrooms were opened up on Monday, September 18. Even our students seemed to be glad to be back in school after the longer summer break!

Now that we are close to completion for our heating project at the Junior-Senior High School, I want to refresh folks memories on why we embarked on this project. The following questions and subsequent "bullet points" will inform you further:

#### Why did the District move forward on this project?

- This project was created by timing and necessity. With monies that we had saved up and levy support from the community, we had the financial means to make this project a reality. The heating systems were antiquated and dying. With the real possibility of a winter as hard as last year, the thought of facing another year without a consistent heating system was not an option.
- When the District brought McKinstry on board, they conducted a detailed facility audit to help us understand exactly what we needed to invest in. The audit informed us of the scope of the project and what would be required to address the immediate issues.

#### What was included in the project?

- New high-efficiency heating, cooling, and ventilation system
- New LED lighting throughout the building
- New and added exit signs
- New T-Bar ceilings
- New electrical subpanels and wiring to new equipment
- Improved ceiling and duct access
- High-efficiency (R-38) insulation added
- Fire/Life Safety upgrades including new fire barriers in all ceiling spaces

While this construction was taking place, it allowed our district tech guru, Heidi Carpenter, and district maintenance director, Bob Lambert, the opportunity to reconstruct our network infrastructure and make much-needed upgrades to our technology cabling and connections.

#### What are the benefits of this project?

- Consistent and comfortable heating & cooling
- The fire and life safety upgrades make the school safer and up-to-code
- Through their facility audits, McKinstry was able to assess the integrity of the facility structure and confidently provide us with the understanding that the school is structurally sound
- We also are aware of what facility needs still to be addressed, which helps for future planning and budgeting
- And most importantly, educational research shows that a school environment can affect student performance, both positively and negatively. When students are in a safe, comfortable environment, educational success is more evident. This project will give us high-quality, efficient lighting, less noise issues from outdated equipment, and better air quality within the building.

#### OUR SCHOOLS—October/November 2017

Occasionally, I must take a time-out from my writings in the C.I.A. Newsletter where I talk about the "district's state of affairs", "upcoming supplemental levies or bonds", or "facilities upgrades". Once in awhile, I want to share some words of inspiration or put a smile on your face. This is one of those times so bear with me.

Back in September, prior to school starting up, the district staff had an orientation day where we all came together to talk about various pieces of business. After we had a great lunch together (Thank you Mr. Renz and Mr. Minden!), I addressed most of the staff and shared with them some bits of humor and hopefully to many, some inspiration going into the new school year. I had the good fortune to attend a conference in August that featured on one workshop day a keynote speaker named Danny Brassell. Mr. Brassell has been a classroom teacher for 30+ years. He has also been an inspirational speaker with a comic's flair, emphasizing the humor in life. He utilizes history facts and trivia to emphasize his points. One such example is this:

"Sarah Josepha Hale was determined to have a National Day of Thanks. She wrote Congress for years, but to no avail. After all, she was a woman, and Hale lived in 19<sup>th</sup> Century America, which, at the time, did not permit women to vote. Still, she kept writing letters. Tons of letters.

The Civil War broke out, and most would agree that it produced some of the darkest days in American history. Sarah Josepha Hale resolved that it was imperative for Americans to come together and count their blessings. So, she wrote even more letters than before. Finally, a gentleman appeased her by reading one of her letters. His name was Abraham Lincoln and Hale's letter persuaded him to declare a national holiday of Thanksgiving in 1863.

Hale never gave up. She was a pioneer, as she was one of the first female novelists in America. Most of her works are largely unknown but she did pen a collection of poems that included what is probably one of the best, if not the best known American nursery rhyme, "Mary Had a Little Lamb".

I thought this example was very appropriate since the Thanksgiving holiday is right around the corner. Mr. Brassell's message was clear and it was one that I wanted to share. We all have difficult days. Sometimes difficult weeks. And, occasionally, a difficult year. But it is extremely important that we don't let it keep us down. As educators, we have an important job to perform in assisting/guiding our students to learn and gain knowledge. As parents, we have a responsibility to raise our children to be better than ourselves. As a community, we have an obligation to provide a supportive environment that nurtures our young people to become productive members of society. Like Sarah Josepha Hale, in striving to reach these goals, we can never give up!

#### **OUR SCHOOLS**—November/December 2017

Way back in March of this year, our district was given the opportunity to participate in a grant program designed to focus on school and community improvement. The grant program, sponsored by the University of Idaho and Boise State University and funded by the Idaho State Board of Education, is focusing on helping school districts with three critical educational elements. These elements are:

- Strengthen curriculum and instruction
- Improving educator effectiveness
- Use data-driven practices to support students, teachers, administrators, and school boards

The program is called SOAR (Support, Opportunity, Achievement, Revitalization). It will be a three-year project and it involves six school districts throughout the state, one district representing each region in the state. Along with our district, which represents Region 2, the SOAR program will include Plummer-Worley (Region 1), Bruneau-Grandview (Region 3), Buhl (Region 4), American Falls (Region 5), and Blackfoot (Region 6),

As part of this project, each of these districts, including ours, will receive through this collaborative effort the opportunity to:

- 1. Complete a district-wide needs assessment
- 2. Create improvement plans that specify research-based best practices to assist the district and the schools in the district in addressing their priorities and needs
- 3. Create regional support teams to help our districts address the identified needs and begin to address sustainable change and improvement
- 4. Build leadership capacity at the Board, district, and building levels in order to improve student achievement and growth
- 5. Identify effective strategies for increasing graduation rates, improving student attendance, raise student achievement, and move toward post-secondary completion
- 6. Develop a dynamic, virtual community of support to promote networking and sustainability
- 7. Provide financial and technical support to build long-term systems of success for the districts

Collaborative workshops have been provided through the fall for district and building leadership, as well as for board members. We have worked with one another, as well as with many of the other district teams to explore our commonalities and our areas of need. We have learned that no matter the size of our districts, large or small, we have


