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Potlatch Arts Council Missoula Children's Theatre:

Missoula Children's Theatre brought the play, *Gulliver's Travels...in Space*, to Potlatch Elementary School the week of April 1-6, 2019. Two actor/directors from the MCT organization came to town, bringing costumes, lighting, sets and backdrop, and most importantly, their considerable talent and expertise. Fifty-eight students, ages 5 – 17, auditioned, and all were selected as actors or assistant directors.



Within 6 days, the kids had memorized a script and songs, had learned acting techniques, and were ready to present a one-hour play for the community. In addition, 105 students participated in three different workshops, learning some of the improvisation and drama techniques that make up a successful play.

Local volunteers spent approximately 100 hours in various capacities to ensure that this would occur. Approximately 250 community members were in attendance at the two performances. All in all, this was a successful community activity that brought together people of all ages to share in the enjoyment and appreciation of the arts.

A successful Art Week at Potlatch Elementary school was held March 18 - 22. Seven volunteer artists came to town to provide art instruction to all students from K - 6. Their work was then displayed at several localities around town. Congratulations to our very talented young people!



THE POTLATCH WI&M DEPOT AND IDAHO GIVES 2019

Donations from Potlatch and surrounding communities have put the WI&M Railway History Preservation Group (HPG) on top of the Idaho Gives (IG) leader board four of the six years since IG began. The HPG is very thankful for your support of our preservation projects in Potlatch.

Built in 1906, the WI&M Railway Depot at Potlatch (Depot) was the first commercial building in Potlatch. The historical heart of the City and the area's economy, the Depot was a decrepit structure when the HPG purchased it in 2001. Fifteen years of restoration work concluded in

2016. Grants and donations from around the country and thousands of volunteer hours contributed to our success.

The 2001 business plan for the Depot envisioned the structure as a museum and cultural center on the first floor, and a business incubator on the second floor. The Depot now contains a WI&M and Potlatch historical museum. The HPG has sponsored fourteen Depot History & Speeder Days, one to two dances annually, arts and crafts markets, four Polar Express Engineer Schools, and several Idaho cultural presentations. Rent from the second floor tenants will pay for future building maintenance.

Besides the WI&M museum in the former ticket office, Karen Rohn maintains her BlackBird store in the waiting room. The Potlatch Historical Society has many of its records stored in a Depot office. Several community groups and local individuals have rented the Depot's freight room. However, our space does not have many of the enhancements that would satisfy a wider variety of users.

So, this year we are raising funds to buy collapsible staging and audio-visual equipment for the Depot's freight room. Our former "stage" has been removed to increase floor space by 100 square feet. The ability to show films, PowerPoint presentations, or other videos to a larger audience will make the freight room more useful to more groups and individuals, and also increase our rental revenue.

More Things You May Not Have Known About the HPG and the Potlatch Depot

The HPG also owns the property between the railroad and SH6, north of the Depot. Our deeded property line is the shoulder of SH6, the traditional separation of the Company Town and WI&M Railway in 1905. Our property extends 60 yards south of 6th Street.

The Depot was recently nominated for an Orchid Award from Preservation Idaho. The Depot restoration and its restorers have received four Orchid Awards from State of Idaho and Latah County historical organizations, and also the Idaho Governor's Award for Historic Preservation.

The HPG sponsors many events each year that require many volunteer hours to accomplish.

We'd appreciate any help we can get! Please know you can volunteer without joining the HPG.

No HPG officer, board member, or volunteer has been compensated since the nonprofit's organization in 1998. Everything we've done and continue to do for the community is accomplished entirely through volunteer labor and the generosity of people like you.

Potlatch Alumni Scholarship

In 1985, a fund was established to annually offer a scholarship to a graduate of Potlatch High School. Each year up to 30 Potlatch High graduates apply for this scholarship. There are four (4) criteria for eligibility for the scholarship:

- Be a graduate of Potlatch High School
- Have demonstrated scholastic or vocational ability
- Have financial need
- Have demonstrated potential to succeed

Applications are available each year from Potlatch High School. Only those making application for the scholarship on forms to be provided, shall be eligible, including prior recipients. Applications shall be available at the Potlatch High School Counselor Linda McCarver’s office after March 1. Completed applications shall be turned into the principal or counselor by May 15.

We encourage alumni to contribute to the fund. All contributions apply only to the principal. The interest gained from donations is awarded annually as a scholarship; therefore, all donations will continue to provide scholarship money forever. An annual report is compiled each year to show additions to the fund, income gained and available, the funds awards and a progress report on the recipients.
