Can't lose weight or keep it off? Feeling run-down and tired and don't know why? Dr. Rayme Geidl provides answers in a free presentation Jan. 7

Dr. Rayme Geidl wants to clear a couple of things up: You can be in a "healthy" weight range but at serious risk of diabetes and/or heart attack. And, if you're always feeling run-down and tired, but usual blood tests come back normal, a more in-depth assessment may be very eye-opening.

Dr. Geidl - the only board certified Obesity Medicine physician in Idaho north of the Boise area - will explain how a person's body chemistry affects their energy levels, weight and general health from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Jan. 7, in the Gritman Conference Center

Not everyone is blessed with favorable genetics, but understanding how an individual's metabolism works allows steps to be taken toward avoiding future problems and correcting those that exist. Those steps might include specific, individualized nutritional changes, medication adjustments, and/or vitamin supplements.

"Some people are technically overweight but very healthy, while other people are at risk of diabetes or heart attacks even though they are normal weight, exercise, and have what they believe is a good diet – this is largely due to genetics," Geidl said. "With the right kinds of blood tests, we can get a pretty good idea of what is wrong and what we need to do about it."

Dr. Geidl, who practices at Moscow Medical, recently opened a clinic, Northwest Metabolic Medicine, dealing exclusively with weight loss, metabolism and related issues. She holds dual board certification, in Family Medicine and Obesity Medicine. She was one of only 158 doctors in the nation to successfully pass the American Board of Obesity Medicine exam in 2013. Dr. Geidl's presentation will be of interest to a variety of people, including people who:

- Feel run-down or out of sorts, even though there is no apparent reason for it and their blood tests appear normal
- Have tried to lose weight but can't, even if they severely restrict their calories
- Have lost weight but haven't been able to keep it off

The trial-and-error method can be very frustrating. Dr. Geidl's passion is to teach each patient how their individual body works, and to lay out a road map of the steps needed to reach their goals. This is accomplished through sophisticated blood tests, body composition assessment, and a thorough evaluation of other potentially contributing factors.

For example, not all people process fat efficiently. Their bodies may not be storing very much fat externally—but they're not burning it up, either, so fat collects in the blood, which is very unhealthy and can raise the risk of heart attacks and strokes. For others, the pancreas produces too much insulin, which causes an excessive storage of fat.



OUR SCHOOLS-January/February, 2015

I'd like to share three important news items with you this month. Two of those drew interest these past few weeks, and one will draw all of our interest these next few months. First, over the Christmas Break, construction work was performed at the Junior-Senior High School. The State of Idaho's Division of Building Safety made an inspection of our facility in October and after reviewing our site, made recommendations to our District to repair our ceilings at the Junior-Senior High School. The concern was that many of the panels and light fixtures overhead were coming loose and would pose a safety risk to our students and staff should they come loose. The work done by Schmidt Construction over the holiday break was able to "shore up" much of the ceiling areas throughout the Junior-Senior High School. At this time, the potential for the ceiling tiles and lighting fixtures to come loose and fall down and hurt someone has been negated. This, however, is just a "band-aid" to one of the many facility issues we face at both the Junior-Senior High School and the Elementary School. Although our schools have served us well, they are both in need of several extensive repairs and system replacements (i.e. – new heating units, new roofs, electrical and lighting upgrades, etc.). All of this comes with a cost so we will begin having public discussions and facilities tours soon in order to look at the running of a Plant Facility Levy in the near future.

Second, our District received a scare recently that put the schools and the community into a high alert mode. The incident was brought on by a young man (a former graduate of PHS) utilizing social media (Facebook and Twitter) to voice his displeasure at life, and "posting" them on-line for others to see. The seriousness of his posts were not known However, Principal Cheryl Riedinger and I felt it was important to get the word out that the schools were aware of this young man's statements and that we would make contact with the Latah County Sheriff's Department for support. The young man was taken into custody and is awaiting support to get the help that he needs. I am proud that Cheryl and I took this stance. Although our actions caused a bit of the stir in the community, it was important to let our schools and community patrons know that we took his comments seriously and that the safety of our students and teachers were foremost on our minds.

Third, at our January School Board Meeting, I made a recommendation to the School Board to set the 2014-2015 Supplemental Levy amount at the <u>same number</u> as this past year's. That levy amount is \$1,390,000. You will have the chance to vote on the Supplemental Levy on Tuesday, March 10, 2015. In the meantime, leading up to that date, the Board and District Administration will set up dates and times for community forums. This will give you, the patrons and tax payers, the opportunity to ask questions and gather answers in order to make an informed decision on the levy. We will also be mailing out levy information to all of our patrons, providing voting information about what the levy is for and where voting polls are located. If you have any questions or are in need of any other information, please feel free to contact me. As always, I thank you for your support of Potlatch students and schools!

Gritman expands expertise in diabetes and food service with new staff certifications

Three Gritman employees have passed tests to certify them in diabetes and food service professions. Todd Unger and Erin Richardson passed the test to become Certified Dietary Managers and Certified Food Protection Professionals. This required 120 hours of instruction plus 150 hours of field experience.

CDMs and CFPPs are experts at managing dietary operations. They are trained and qualified to manage all food service operations, including menus, food purchasing and preparation; ensuring food safety, managing work teams and related duties. Attainment of these certifications requires passing a nationally-recognized credentialing exam and fulfilling continuous requirements needed to maintain certified status.

Unger has been promoted to Lead Cook at Gritman. Richardson is the Coordinator for the Food Service department at Gritman.

Mary Skoglund, a Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN) and Licensed Dietitian (LD), recently passed the test to become a Certified Diabetes Educator (CDE), making her Gritman's third staff member to become a CDE. To qualify to take the test she was required to have a minimum of 2 years of professional practice experience as a Registered Dietitian plus provide a minimum of 1,000 hours of Diabetes Self Management Education. To maintain certification status, Mary will obtain regular continuing education.

A CDE is a health professional who possesses comprehensive knowledge of and experience in diabetes management, prediabetes, and diabetes prevention. A CDE educates and supports people affected by diabetes to understand and manage the condition. A CDE promotes self-management to achieve individualized goals.

"Gritman Medical Center always encourages staff to pursue additional expertise and certifications", said Nancy Kure, RDN, LD, CDE, Director of Diabetes, Nutrition and Food Services at Gritman. "We are pleased that Todd, Erin and Mary have worked so hard to improve their professional abilities and this will benefit the public as well."

City of Moscow to Host Palouse River Basin Adjudication Informational Presentation

The City of Moscow is hosting an informational presentation by Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR) to provide information on the second phase of the North Idaho Adjudication process, specifically the Palouse River Basin Adjudication project. The presentation will be held in the City of Moscow Council Chambers of City Hall, 206 E Third Street, Moscow, Idaho at 9:30 a.m. on February 24, 2015. This workshop is open to anyone interested in learning more about this important judicial process and the potential effects it may have on citizens of the Palouse Basin.

The session will address the history, current status, and future of the PRBA and perspectives of IDWR and other stakeholders regarding water rights, timelines, and the adjudication process in general. IDWR Director Gary Spackman will be at the workshop on behalf of IDWR to provide information about the adjudication process. District Court Adjudication Judge Eric Wildman will also provide comments at the session. It is anticipated that IDWR will request funding authorization in the Fiscal Year 2016 Budget to begin the PRBA process.

In 2006, the Idaho Legislature authorized the IDWR to proceed with planning and designing the administrative mechanisms for commencing three water right adjudications in Northern Idaho, Coeur d'Alene and Spokane River Basin (underway since 2008), Palouse River Basin (anticipated in late 2015 or early 2016), and Clark Fork – Pend Oreille River Basin (TBD). This order made the United States, the Tribes, the State, local governments, and private property owners parties to the adjudication of all water rights in the Coeur d'Alene-Spokane Rivers water system. The adjudication will not change how water is used, if the water user has followed Idaho law in establishing a water right. Commencement notices have been sent to property owners informing each of the need to file claims for water rights.

Adjudication is a process that provides for an inventory and catalog of water rights at a particular moment in time as determined by the court. In this case, the Idaho Supreme Court designated an Idaho district court to conduct the adjudication aided and advised by IDWR. IDWR must have a complete and accurate list of all water rights to deliver water to those who are entitled, when disputes on use or delivery arise. Also, the list is needed in order to estimate how much water is available for future development of the water resource.

OUR SCHOOLS—February/March 2015

In last month's CIA, I shared with you that once again we will be running our Supplemental Levy Vote in March. The date for the vote will be on Tuesday, March 10. Levy "town hall" forums in the past few years have been held in Potlatch, Princeton, and Harvard. However, this year, we will only host two forums. One will be held on Monday, February 23rd at 7:00 p.m. at Potlatch Junior-Senior High School and one other will be held on Wednesday, February 25th at 7:00 p.m. at Potlatch Elementary School. The Board of Trustees and myself hope that you can join us either of the evenings in order to hear the importance of the supplemental levy to our District, to share information, and to answer questions you may have about the levy and/or the "state of affairs" for the District, as well as for the State of Idaho.

The following is information you may need to know about the supplemental levy and what is being asked for:

- The levy is used to finance daily school district operations. This includes purchasing of materials and supplies, salaries and benefits for school personnel, transportation costs, and facilities upkeep (utilities, building and grounds maintenance, etc.).
- This year's levy amount is \$1,390,000. This is the same amount asked for last year. No changes needed.
- Projected cost to you as a taxpayer will remain \$6.12 per \$1,000 of assessed home value.
- The polling sites are located at Scenic 6 Park, Mountain Home Grange, Rebekah Hall, Palouse River Community Center, and the Harvard Community Hall.
- Polls will open up at 8:00 a.m. and close up at 8:00 p.m.
- If you cannot vote on the day of the levy and would like to complete an absentee ballot, you can go to the Latah County Courthouse, Auditor's/Recorder's Office, Room 101 and complete a ballot. You may also call the Latah County Courthouse in order to have a ballot sent to you which you mail back once completed.
- A flyer will be mailed to all residences in the Potlatch School District. It will provide information on the levy, including district highlights this past year.

Each and every year the supplemental levy is an integral component for our District's operation. With this support, we are able to maintain and improve upon our educational programs, as well as provide continued quality educational opportunities for the students of our community. As always I thank you for your support and ask that you remember to vote on Tuesday, March 10.

OUR SCHOOLS April/May 2015

Recently, the Idaho Legislature came to a close for their 2015 Legislative session. Many items were discussed and bills passed in areas concerning Health & Human Services, Transportation (Highways and Roads), and Natural Resources. But the focus of legislators this year was set squarely on Education and improving Idaho's education system. I am going to share several of the highlights of the legislation that was passed and what that means for our district and community this upcoming year.

Major increases were made to the State's Public Schools Support Program (the Budget) this session. The Appropriation Bills that passed included the following increases:

- \$101.2 Million overall increase to the Education budget (a growth of 7.4% from the previous year).
- 33.2 Million ongoing from the State's General Fund for <u>discretionary dollars</u>. This is funding that will be distributed to all school districts throughout the state, giving each district the *discretion* to use however they see fit for their particular district.
- 26.9 Million for facilities maintenance (64% increase from the previous year).
- 13 Million for classroom technology (66% increase from the previous year).
- 6 Million for Advanced Opportunities for high school students to complete college level courses while they are still in high school.
- 3% salary increases to Certified and Classified staff alike.
- Additional funding increases to help support Transportation Services, Idaho Digital Learning Academy (IDLA), Technology Infrastructure (WiFi), District Strategic Planning, and Professional Development opportunities.

These increases bring excellent news to our district. Discretionary dollars give us more flexibility to maintain operations and help pay for ongoing utilities. Our facilities, which I believe are a high of a priority in our district at this time, will be able to receive extra funding to help with much-needed repairs and upgrades in certain areas (such as security doors, new lock systems, roof repairs, etc.). Although the State has not come up with an answer to addressing the concern of the ever-growing supplemental levy problem that school districts and taxpayers face each year, this increase in funding from the State is a step in the right direction. As an educator, I appreciate the efforts made by the Idaho Legislature and the work that they were able to do. Their efforts will have a positive effect on students and schools throughout Idaho, including here at Potlatch.

One additional note, last month I mentioned that on Tuesday, May 19, voting polls will be open to vote for new School Board Trustees for Zone 2 and Zone 4. In actuality, only Zone 2 will have a race. Two (2) candidates will be vying for this vacancy. The candidates are Mrs. Emily Hunt and Mr. Billie Howard. We wish both candidates the very best. As for Zone 4, Ryan Beckner ran unopposed and therefore, will be able to fill the vacancy. Congratulations, Ryan!

OUR SCHOOLS

Although the school year has come to a close, there is plenty of work to be done, as well as the hustle and bustle of kids still attending specialized programs during the summer months. We will have 30+ students involved in our Elementary Reading Program, as well as 5 to 8 students involved in our ESY (Extended School Year) program throughout the summer. Thank you to the teachers and paraprofess ionals who are putting their time and effort in helping these programs run smoothly and help students continue to be successful.

Several facility projects are scheduled to take place and be completed over the summer. Bob Lambert, Maintenance and Grounds Supervisor, and his crew are hard at work getting the schools into tip-top shape in anticipation of the next school year. Projects scheduled this summer include:

- Painting the rest of the exterior walls of the Elementary.
- Putting in new locks and security system for the Elementary and the Junior-Senior High School.
- Painting of several interior walls at both sites.
- Adding a sidewalk from the main entrance of the Elementary to cross over to the upper playground area.
- Removing the concrete barriers by the Elementary on Elm Street. Putting in planter boxes to replace the concrete barriers.

I want to take this moment to thank Mr. Bruce Mobarry, Junior High Science teacher, and Mr. Aaron Schiffelbein, district-wide Counselor, for their time and service to our students and to our district. I wish them all the very best in their new endeavors.

Last month I gave a "shout out" to one of our new Board members, Mr. Ryan Beckner, who will now fill the Zone 4 Board slot, formerly held by Heidi Davis. This month I give a "shout out" to Mrs. Emily Hunt. Emily will be our newest "elected" Board member. She will be our Zone 2 representative, taking the place of Darin French, who like, Heidi, is stepping down from office. I am so appreciative and proud of the work that Heidi and Darin have done through the years. They, like all of the Board, put in hours and hours of their time to the success of our schools. A simple "Thank You" is not enough to show the gratitude I have for the work that they have done and the leadership they have provided over the years. They will be missed! 

Although the application process is somewhat tedious (you do have to fill a new application out each year), the benefits are tremendous. This is an essential program for our students. Healthy meals provided by the school district are important to the educational growth and success of our students – healthy meals help students learn! Over my many years as an administrator, I have seen parents avoid applying for this program for various reasons. However, the more parents that apply and students qualify for support, the more our schools are subsidized and are provided monies back into the District, not only for food service programming, but district-wide educational programming as well. This is a "win – win" opportunity for both you, as parents, and for the District. So I urge you to apply. If you need further information on the Free and Reduced Breakfast/Lunch program, go on-line and go to: www.fns.usda.gov/school-meals/applying-free-and-reduced-price-school-meals.





Our Schools—September 2015

On the evening of September 3, in the Junior-Senior High School's gym, the Board of Trustees and the District Administration hosted their first community forum to discuss our current district facilities and future facility needs. Along with 50+ patrons, the Board of Trustees, and district administration, representatives from Zion National Bank, Schneider Electric, and Rimrock Consulting were on hand to take part in the discussion as well as answer questions patrons and board members

Discussion centered on the growing need to make our community aware that our facilities, especially the Junior-Senior High School, are in need of repair, retrofitting, or possibly even more, such as the building of a new secondary facility. The professionals who were in attendance shared their expertise on what it would take to repair/retrofit our facilities versus looking at a new construction project.

As your superintendent of schools, I need to provide you all the information you will need and all the opportunities to gather that information, in order to make an informed decision when it comes time to decide what direction we, as a district, decide to go in order to better our school facilities. This community forum was the first of several that we hope to be able to provide that will shed light on the District's needs, as well as look at solutions to the facility concerns. Since finances are so critical to making these decisions come to fruition, I would like to share the differences between the levees that you, as stakeholders and voters, would be and will be most familiar with and will be hearing more about:

Supplemental Levy (also called Maintenance & Operation Levy – they are one in the same)

Used to help run normal, day-to-day operations in the District; this includes running of programs, purchasing of supplies & materials, etc.

At this time, it is voted on yearly by taxpayers. For the last two years, no increases to this levy and we usually run this in the March election.

Plant/Facility Levy

Used to help fund maintenance projects for the District, which includes retrofitting facilities (such as adding new carpeting, replacing HVAC systems, and upgrading roofs).

Funds cannot be used toward the construction of new facilities.

This is a single amount – voted on at one time – spread out over "x" amount of years (maximum of 10 years on term) – with monies dedicated to just maintenance projects.

Bond Levy

Used to fund new construction projects.

Requested fund amounts are large due to the necessity and cost of new construction projects.

Bonds can be issued up to a 30-year term.

Can receive assistance through the Bond Levy Equalization program to help pay a portion of the District's annual debt service. This is information that I hope will help you. I would also like to extend an invitation for you to attend our next Community Forum. It is scheduled for Thursday, October 8 at 7:00 p.m. in the Junior-Senior High School gym. We will present further information and talk more about the facility needs of the District.




THE SHARING TREE

Update from the Jr. Sr. High School Science Department

"The Potlatch Jr-Sr High School is busy in the Science Department." We are planning for our 2nd annual <u>Science Carnival on November 5 at 6:30 p.m.</u> Students are preparing a wide variety of projects on topics from candy chemistry to animal behavior. The inspiration for some of these projects might be our "mini zoo" in the high school science classroom; this year we have two rats, an anole, two tree frogs and an assortment of fish to "liven up" our learning environment.

Forensics is learning skills to help tsolve a mock crime scene while Biology is learning the fundamentals of life.

Physical Anthropology has been investigating our human ancestors and has created a human family tree in our classroom.

Chemistry is busy learning skills and knowledge to help them in college Chemistry such as writing electron configurations.

Potlatch Physical Science students learned about formulas for calculating distance, speed, and time, unit conversion factors, and dimensional analysis. They undoubtedly enjoyed the engineering design process the best when they put this knowledge into action in the NASA egg drop challenge. Each team was given a few recycled materials and asked to construct landing gear for a raw egg to protect it from breaking on impact when dropped from 25 feet high! Nearly all were a success.

Our Earth Science students just completed a unit on the utility of maps, the different types of earth models, and GPS in studying our earth. Students learned how to use a GPS to set or find locations using latitude and longitude, how to read topography maps for their personal use, and how to make a map of an area.

Our Life Science students have been busy learning how living things are identified and classified. Just ask them how they memorized these lists of criteria and organization. They have learned through experiments of their own how best to grow brine shrimp and clover plants. Potlatch student scientists are going to "wow" you with their team projects from hydrogen generators, mudslides, and an ice volcano! We are proud of their efforts. All of this knowledge and information will be represented in some form or other in our Science Carnival so be sure to attend!"

AFTER SCHOOL ART PROGRAM





Here are a few highlights from Potlatch Jr. Sr. High School.

Our first quarter awards assembly was held on Nov. 6. All students and many parents attended the assembly celebrating our Honor Roll, Character Trait Awards, Science Awards, and the KLEW Academic Student All Star Award. Thirty one of our students received a certificate for getting straight A's. Twelve students received certificates and are being honored and recognized on our hallway bulletin boards for exhibiting "Acceptance" of all in our school. Cole Wallen was interviewed by KLEW, received a certificate and was aired on public television for his outstanding academic leadership in our school. Our staff is extremely proud of our students. 140 of our students received a 3.0 or higher grade point average for the first quarter of this school year.

Mr. Wilson from our history department organized a successful Veterans Day Assembly on November 11 to honor and celebrate our past and present Armed Service Heroes.

This leads into sharing what our students are studying in the Jr. and Sr. High history department. The 7th Graders will be studying the United States and Canada while the 8th Graders are studying North Africa, Southwest Asia, and Central Asia. The students are currently learning about the regions' culture, religion and how it has affected the areas.

In Economics, we will be learning about money, banking, and the Federal Reserve System. The goal this month is to help them understand what money is, why it is used, and how our state and our country use money to meet their needs. We will also look into the fractional reserve banking concept, and look into what the Federal Reserve is, and how it works.

In U.S. History, we will be learning about the Dred Scott Decision, Secession, the attack on Fort Sumter, and begin our study of the American Civil War. We will look into the causes and consequences of the war, and we will be watching clips from the movie Gettysburg to help the students better understand the battle tactics used during the 1860's.

In World History, we will be learning about the Byzantine Empire, the Mongols, and Feudal Japan. Besides the reading of our texts, the students will be creating either Byzantine art or Japanese art to add to their portfolios. In Government the students just finished learning about The Constitution and Federalism. Shortly the students will be learning about the Legislative branch.

All our students at PHS wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

OUR SCHOOLS

In the past few months we have had three Community Forums, held at the Junior-Senior High School, to discuss the possibilities of retrofitting our facilities or put together plans for the design and construction of a new junior-senior high school facility. Either option will require the District to ask for community support through the passing of a Plant Facility Levy or the passing of a Bond Levy. I have previously shared the differences between the two levy systems in the October edition of the CIA. Our hope has been, through these forums, to provide an opportunity for community awareness, community feedback, and community support to this project. I, as well as the Potlatch School Board, have been pleased with the attendance at these meetings, as well as the depth of questions that have been asked and information that has been provided. As we move though December and into the new year, the Board will be making the decision at our January Board Meeting to approve the running of a Plant Facility Levy or a Bond Levy. That election would be held in March. Although we will not be scheduling any further Community Forums until after the new year arrives, I want to give the community and stakeholders the opportunity to call or contact myself or any of the school board members for further information or questions that you may have concerning this very important project.
