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

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

#### OUR SCHOOLS, January, 2017

Happy New Year to one and all! It certainly has been a "white and wonderful" start to the new year, well, some may only agree to the "white", not so much to the "wonderful" term. Already this year, we have had two days of school closure due to the bad weather and road conditions. Added to the four days that were missed earlier in December, due to mostly the same circumstances (one day being closed due to heating repairs in the Junior-Senior High School building), there have been six (6) days lost altogether this current school year. Two questions that have been asked the most and that I will try and provide an explanation for are the following:

#### Question #1:

#### With the amount of school closures we have had this school year, when do students and staff have to make up days in the summer to make up for this lost time?

The Idaho State Department of Education requires that all districts have a minimum amount of instructional hours that each student at each grade level is to receive. These are:

- ♦ Kindergarten 450 hours
- Grades 1-3 810 hours
- Grades 4-8 900 hours
- ♦ Grades 9-11 990 hours
- ♦ Grade 12 979 hours

On our district's instructional calendar, we meet these minimums and more. So although we have closed school for six days (up to now), students and staff will not need to make up this time. We can lose, in essence, two more days and still will be able to meet our instructional hours, as required by the State of Idaho.

#### Question #2:

#### How do you determine that the roads are bad, due to the weather, and a school closure is warranted? What is your notification procedure?

It truly does come down to the safety of our students and the bus drivers. As superintendent, I have been empowered by the Board of Trustees to make this decision in cancelling the school day. It is not an arbitrary decision. I require Jerry Schwartzman, Transportation Supervisor, to go out and check our bus route roads and be in touch with our Latah County road crews, to get a feel on what our decision may need to be. Once contacted and assessed of the road conditions, I will make the decision to call off a school day or not. Once that decision has been made, I contact building administrators and department heads, who will then start their "phone trees" contacting our staff. As for communication to our students, parents, and general community, I then contact television stations, radio stations, post it on our website, post it on our emergency alert notice on our phone app., and ask Shirley Ackerman, Zone 5 Trustee, to place it up on Facebook.

Hopefully, we will not have to face more school closures this school year. But if we do, this is how we make our instructional decisions, as well as the procedure we follow to make these school closures happen.

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




February 20, 2017



#### **OUR SCHOOLS**

The past four years we have run our Supplemental Levy in the month of March. We will continue down that path this year as well and will be asking voters to vote on our annual supplemental levy on the county election day of Tuesday, March 14. Sometimes it's difficult to keep straight what each levy is about and what the monies go for. So, simply defined, our supplemental levy assists us with the <u>day-to-day operational costs</u> that are needed to run the District. The following are the areas that our supplemental levy provides support for:

- Daily utility costs.
- Transportation costs.
- Food service support.
- Facility maintenance, upkeep, and repair projects.
- Salaries and benefits for staff.
- Supplies and materials for instruction.
- Technology infrastructure and upgrades.
- Building security.

As you are all aware, the School Board and I have shared, over the last 2 to 3 years, our sense of urgency to build a new Junior-Senior High School, due to the failing systems in the current building. After the failure of the Building Bond Levy to pass last May and after seeing the overwhelming numbers of "no" votes cast that day, it was apparent that more work and information needed to be completed before we could run a bond levy again. Although we will continue to plan for this option, we <u>will not</u> be running a bond levy for a new school anytime soon.

However, the problems that existed before in our facilities continue to exist today. We have to address them this coming school year – this is a must! These projects will include replacement of our heating system (HVAC units and ductwork) at the Junior-Senior High School and upgrading our electrical system and capacity at both the Elementary and Junior-Senior High School. These projects will be <u>expensive</u>. We will utilize the majority of our Fund Balance to pay for these costs but this may still not be enough to cover the costs so the Board and I are asking to raise the supplemental levy quite significantly in order to meet this demand. The levy amount being asked for is \$1,900,000, an increase of \$510,000 (currently we are at \$1,390,000).

Understanding the District's needs and what we are hoping to accomplish by asking for this amount cannot be fully addressed in this format so we are providing two informational community forums that will provide you with more extensive information, as well as allow you the opportunity to address questions to both our Board members and myself. Please plan to attend either one or both of these events. They will be at the Junior-Senior High School Gym from **7:00** to **9:00 p.m.** on **Thursday, March 2** and **Tuesday, March 7**.

I would like to share that this year three Board Zone positions are up for election. This election will be on Tuesday, May 16. The three zones that will be up will be Zone 1, Zone 3, and Zone 5. If you live in one of those zones and are interested in being a candidate for your zone, the last day for filing with the county is <u>March 17, by 5:00 p.m.</u> If you need further information or candidacy forms, please go to our district website – <u>www.psd285.org</u> – or visit the District Office. We will be glad to assist you with this process.

#### **Dear Community Members**,

Members of Let's Get It Started worked for many years to provide a safe and secure environment for our Potlatch students. After many years of fundraising, the Potlatch Landing Community Center came into existence. The Landing has hosted an average of 10 kids per open day and has been rented out for birthday parties, family reunions, school functions, church studies, and more. The Landing has been maintained on a small budget with much donated help and services.

In 2016, a grant was written to house students at the Landing in an afterschool program modeled by the successful 21st Century Elementary School program. The hope was to keep people in the Landing engaged in the activities held there and create a true community hub for the afterschool program and the community.

Through a series of events, the Landing was never considered as a site for the afterschool program after the 21st Century 7-12 grant was awarded. For the last several months the LGIS board has fought tirelessly to bring the vision to the Landing. During this time, the LGIS board submitted their annually awarded report and grant request to the Recreation District to ask for continued support and funding - funds that would keep the Landing open and potentially house the after school program. We have been told that the Potlatch Recreation District committee allocated only enough monies to pay the rent for the Potlatch Landing. Although appreciated, that offer is not enough to keep the doors open. Building issues caused us to close our doors the end of January and unfortunately, lack of funding will keep them closed.

We are disappointed and exhausted. As such, all items inside the Landing will need to be sold and removed by February 26. We will be posting items for sale on Facebook and other social media sites. Please contact Kathi, Jen, Julie or Debi if you are interested in any item and we will post more information as time permits. Monies raised will go towards our existing and future programs sponsored by Let's Get It Started.



#### 2017 Call for Public Art: Moscow Public Library

The City of Moscow; the Moscow Arts Commission; and the Latah County Library District are seeking submissions for the Moscow Public Library - Call for Public Art.

#### Deadline for submissions is Wednesday, May 3, 2017 by 5:00 p.m.

#### SITE DESCRIPTION

In June 1904 the members of the Pleiades Club and the Ladies Historical Club obtained a grant from philanthropist Andrew Carnegie to construct a free public library in Moscow. The Spanish Mission-style building was designed by Boise architect, Watson Vernon, and the library was completed in March 1906. An addition on the north side of the library was opened in January 1983. The Carnegie portion of the library building is on the National Register of Historic Places. Its most striking feature is the gable style with its graceful curves protruding above the roofline. The tile roof is unusual in this climate. Originally the entrance was approached by a curving stairway on either side. The current public entrance is in the newer part of the library. In 2013 the entrance was renovated, replacing the crumbling steps and adding an ADA-compliant ramp and a plaza area for outdoor public seating as well as group programs. New railings and dark-sky-friendly exterior lights were installed. Waterwise and native landscaping was planted to conserve water and attract pollinators, introducing an educational element into the library grounds. Today the Moscow Public Library is the headquarters of the Latah County Library District, which has six additional branch libraries throughout the county. The Moscow Public Library serves residents of all ages from area communities as well as the University of Idaho campus.

#### **DESIGN OBJECTIVE**

The desired outcome for this public art project is innovative one-ofa-kind work that visually activates this City of Moscow Library entrance and generates high visibility. The work should be of a scale that achieves volume and/or verticality to assure a strong presence. Secondarily, the artwork should inspire daily passersby and bicyclists, enhancing their experience of the library as a place to pause.

#### ARTWORK PARAMETERS

The design may be a single piece or several thematic-related elements. The work may be either freestanding or integrated into the existing concrete seating wall and/or pathways. All freestanding artwork must be set back from the sidewalk by ten feet (10'). Artists should consider this a permanent work of art, designed and engineered to be stable and durable for a minimum of thirty (30) years. Any medium appropriate for exterior siting will be considered. The artwork will need to withstand extreme changes in weather conditions. Of critical importance is the need for consideration of public safety, graffiti and stain resistance, and low maintenance.

#### BUDGET

The budget specified for the project is a not-to-exceed amount of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000). This not-to-exceed amount must cover all costs for design work, engineering, fabrication, transportation, delivery, site preparation and installation, as well as insurance, artist's fee, travel expenses—everything.

I cannot stress enough the importance of our supplemental levy and what it pays for in our district. So I thank the community in showing their support for our students and our schools. Although it wasn't an overwhelming amount of approval, it was <u>still</u> approval. For that I am grateful.

Upcoming This May, voters in Zone 5 will be asked to vote for a new School Board Trustee to represent their zone. Mrs. Shirley Ackerman will be stepping down and vacating this position after years of service to her zone, the school district, and the students of Potlatch. Please take the time to thank Shirley for the time that she devoted to serving on the Board of Trustees.

Two candidates will be vying for the vacated position. They are Mr. Ty Winther and Mr. John Carpenter. Two other zones, Zone 1 and Zone 3, trustees are up for reelection as well. However, just a little different scenario than what is taking place in Zone 5. Mrs. Keri LeForce has applied to run for her second term on the School Board and will be running unopposed for Zone 1.

Zone 3 (the town of Potlatch) does not currently have a candidate declaring to run. This zone is currently being represented by Mr. Jeff Stolz. However, Jeff will need to step down when his term ends at the end of June. Jeff does not live in Zone 3 and therefore cannot, by Idaho Code, run for a vacant board position in a zone that he does not reside in. Jeff was appointed by the then current Potlatch School Board to fill the vacancy since there was no interest by anyone in Zone 3. The same thing could occur this summer as well. If there is no interest by a person in Zone 3 to fill the Trustee position, interested patrons who live in other zones throughout the district can apply to fill the vacancy and interview with the Board. The Board will then be able to select the candidate of their choice, in order to fill the vacant position.

As you can see, it is quite a process to fill a vacated Board Trustee position. However, if you, or someone you know, would like to serve on the Board but would like further information, please contact our District Office or contact one of our current Board members. Thank you.



#### **OUR SCHOOLS** April/May 2017

As I write this month's update to the CIA, I can't help<u>not</u> thinking of the phrase, "*April showers bring May flowers*", since it is pouring rain outside my window. It certainly has been a snow-filled winter, as well as a wet, wet Spring. All of this moisture has been needed but it will be nice to see the sunshine come out on a daily basis once again!

With May coming upon us, I want to remind folks that there is an election date in May. On Tuesday, May 16, there will be an election in Zone 5 to choose a new Board Trustee for that zone. Only residents in this zone can cast a vote for the candidate of their choice. The two individuals vying for this Trustee position are Ty Winther and John Carpenter. In Zone 3, we had no candidates for the vacant Trustee position; therefore, the position will be open to <u>any and all</u> residents in the Potlatch School District, no matter what zone you reside in. This will not be an elected position, the candidate of choice will be chosen by the current Board of Trustees to fill the vacant position. If you, or someone you know, may be interested in filling this position, they or yourself, can go to the District's website for instructions on applying for candidacy (<u>www.psd285.org</u>) **or** contact the District Office directly for assistance.

It's important to inform you that, although we are not moving forward yet with plans to run a Bond this year or build a new junior-senior high school immediately, school administration and the Board have not been idle in working towards answers to our current facility concerns. We have been looking at solutions to the complicated heating issues at the Junior-Senior High School, talking to area experts about our particular needs. At the request of the Board of Trustees, we advertised and placed notice for interested heating companies to send us their qualifications, in the hope that we can bring heating experts on board to help us solve our issues at the Junior-Senior High School, giving us viable options that will allow us to upgrade to a more reliable, energy efficient, and cost-effective heating system.

Lastly, I wanted to share the exciting news that in March, our district was chosen to be a partner with five (5) other schools throughout the state, to be part of the **SOAR** Grant Program. The acronym **SOAR** stands for "*Support, Opportunity,* <u>Achievement, Revitalization</u>". This program will look at school improvement and school success. The program is a three (3) year, \$750,000 grant and is a joint collaborative effort between the University of Idaho and Boise State University. The funding of this program comes from the efforts of the Idaho State Board of Education. I am truly honored that we will have this opportunity to involve our school district in this cutting-edge project. I will report more on this project in future editions of the CIA, as well as share information on our district website. Stay tuned!



#### Potlatch 7-12 After School Program

We are nearing the end of another school year for the Potlatch School District and the end of the first year for the Potlatch 7 -12 After School Program. It has been an eventful year for the after-school program with many highs and lows, but through it all we are remaining positive and moving forward.

If you haven't heard by now, we are under new management. In March, we saw Melissa Smith take over as director of the program with Bridget Bailey assuming the role of assistant director. Also during March, we saw two of our paraprofessionals move on to new opportunities outside of the program, and we have re-filled one of the two positions with Shannon Mitchell who started in early April.

Our program enrollment numbers remain low, but we have been working hard to promote and advertise the program to encourage more students to participate in this great opportunity. For instance, did you know:

- We offer homework help and tutoring during the program. Each day we have a teacher on hand to provide assistance for any subject a student might be struggling with.
- Each day includes free time, homework time, and an activity. The program starts right after school with a snack and pick up/release time is by 6:00 p.m. Monday-Thursday.
- Students are not required to attend the program every day for the entire daily session. If your student needs to leave early or show up late, or if they can only attend certain days of the week, we can work with their after-school schedule.
- We provide a safe, enriching place for students to hang out before and after practice or club meetings. Any student who signs up is welcome to stop by and do homework or participate in that day's activity before or after practice.
- We provide transportation after the program. A bus picks up students in the program at 6:00 p.m. at the high school and will drop them off at the Potlatch Y, Princeton Community Center, or Harvard Park.
- **Students are exposed to a variety of character, career, and enrichment activities.** Program events in April included a first aid class with Debi Swinney at the Potlatch Fire Department, fitness and nutrition classes with Nancy Smith, mural painting with Karen Rohn, and a short course on the history and culture of Mexico culminating with a Family Night Fiesta Celebration Dinner on April 25.
- **Everything in the program is provided FREE of charge to the students and their families.** This opportunity is open to ALL students in grades 7-12 in Potlatch School District #285, whether they attend Potlatch Junior/Senior High School or are being home schooled. *All that we require is a completed and signed registration form for each student in the program.*

We have a short month for in May, with the last day of after school programming on Thursday, May 18. However, we will offer a short, FREE, summer session in June. The summer program will run Monday-Thursday from noon to 5:00 p.m. at the high school starting June 5 and ending June 15. Transportation to and from the program is provided. On tap for the summer session will be field trips to Palouse Discovery Science Center in Pullman and a variety of other activities like swimming, art, and cooking. Snacks will be provided; however, we ask that students eat lunch before attending. A swim pass will be provided for the students during the summer session, however, students who attend at least 4 out of the 8 days of the session will get to keep and use that swim pass for the summer at the Potlatch Pool!

Registration is also open now for the next school year. You are encouraged to fill out an application as soon as possible since the 20 open spots in the program will be filled on a first-come-first-serve basis. This pre-enrollment will also help us with our program budgeting and planning for the next school year. *Students who are pre-registered by May 30 will be entered into a drawing for a \$50 Amazon gift card!* Forms can be picked up at Potlatch High School and City Hall, or you can request a copy to be mailed or emailed to you by contacting Melissa Smith at melissasmith@potlatch.com or 208-892-4032; or Bridget Bailey at 208-874-7014. I greeted him with a, "What's up, Grinch?" and his only reply was, "Can we go somewhere and talk?" I said, "You bet." As we walked toward the barn, I was thinking this is so unlike him and something very serious must of happened. We found a couple bales of straw, sat down and I asked him, "What's going on, Grinch?" He sat there with a look that resembled a twenty foot stare in a ten foot room which, by the way, was making me awful nervous. 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


We will also be filling the Vocational Ag. Science position as well. The District would like to thank Mr. Greg McCoy for being a great support as an emergency teacher this past year in this position.

Do you want to learn **PRESERVE** how to safely can, dry or freeze your garden's bounty? University of University of Idaho Extension Idaho Extension invites you to enroll in

Preserve@Home, an online food preservation class to teach individuals how to safely preserve a variety of food products. Participants learn how to produce high-quality, preserved foods and the science behind food preservation and food safety.

The registration deadline is Monday, June 5, 2017. The first lesson of the 6-week course opens online on Thursday, June 8 at 1 pm MDT. Each lesson includes online text (that can be downloaded and printed), online bulletin board to facilitate participant discussion, and a real-time weekly chat to interact with classmates and instructors. The weekly online chat session for the first lesson will be on Thursday, June 15 from 1:00 to 1:45 p.m. MDT. Topics to be covered include: Foodborne Illness - causes and prevention, Spoilage and Canning Basics, Canning High Acid Foods, Canning Specialty High Acid Foods – pickles, salsa, jams, jellies, etc., Canning Low Acid Foods, and Freezing and Drying. Supplemental materials will include materials on planting varieties for food preservation, cold storage and root cellaring.




what was left of my meager snack. (minus the burrito).

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
