## OUR SCHOOLS - December 2012

With the recent tragedy that happened with the shooting of children and teachers at an elementary school in Connecticut, it has made us more aware and hyper-sensitive to the safety of our children and what is being done in our district to prevent such an act from happening here. On our district webpage is a letter that I drafted addressing this very issue. I feel that it is important enough to have it reprinted here in the C.I.A. Newsletter:

“In the wake of the horrific tragedy in Newtown, Connecticut on Friday, December 14<sup>th</sup>, I know that this has brought up questions and concerns for the safety of our own children and the security measures that we have established within our district. Each classroom teacher has a copy of the district’s Emergency Response Handbook. In the handbook, valuable information is provided, such as emergency call numbers, administrators’ and teachers’ responsibilities and protocols, and strategies that will be used in case of an emergency crisis, such as an intruder alert/lockdown situation. Drills are held

throughout the year that help students and staff understand and practice what they should do in case of an emergency, whether it be a monthly fire drill or a semester intruder alert drill. We work with the Latah Co. Sheriff’s Dept. in coordinating these lockdown drills and reviewing safety plans. We also do safety inspections throughout the year, looking at our facilities and eliminating, when we can, security issues. These, and others, are several of the steps and strategies that we do to address emergency situations and make our schools safer.

We understand that the media sometimes sensationalizes these crisis events. Information is not always correct until days later. My hope is that as parents, family, and friends, we work together to make our children aware of the events but not throw them into a panic or make them scared to come to school. Children are resilient and handle these situations differently than we do as adults. So please, talk to your children, inform them, and of course, show them that you care. That helps us immensely.

Although we are educators and teaching is what we do, our first and most important task is to keep our children **safe**. We will always put the safety of our students above our own. You have entrusted us to do so and that is our commitment to you. We hope that a situation like the one in Connecticut never happens in our community but know that we will continue to be vigilant and protective of our students and strive to maintain their safety in our schools...”

Thank you for your support throughout the year. Our next Board Meeting is scheduled for Thursday, January 10. We will be discussing, formulating, and setting a supplemental levy dollar amount for the 2013-2014 school year. You are welcome to attend, share your thoughts, and be part of the discussion. Happy Holidays to one and all!!

## Adult Winter Reading Program at the Potlatch Public Library

For the past several years, the Friends of the Potlatch Library have hosted the annual Adult Winter Reading Program for young adults to those who are young at heart to celebrate reading and the library in our community. I'm pleased to announce the programming for the 2013 series which will complement various events marking the sesquicentennial of the Idaho territory.

The following programs will be held the Potlatch Public Library at 1010 Onaway Road, Potlatch, ID beginning at 7:00 p.m.

Tuesday, January 29, 2013, "Coeur d'Alene Indian Country," John Hartman, Coeur d'Alene Tribe Cultural Resource Information Systems and Potlatch resident, and Felix Aripa, Coeur d'Alene Tribal Elder. Mr. Aripa is one of two remaining native speakers of the Coeur d'Alene language, and is also a World War II veteran. We look forward to their talk about Idaho history from another perspective.

Tuesday, February 19, 2013, "Inventing Idaho Territory," Keith Petersen, Idaho State Historian and Associate Director of the Idaho State Historical Society (and author of *Company Town: Potlatch, Idaho, and the Potlatch Lumber Company*). We look forward to his talk - especially the connection between Idaho and Abraham Lincoln who was president when Idaho became a territory!

Tuesday, March 19, 2013, "Heritage Gardening," Theresa Greiner, Fiddlers Ridge Plant Farm, Potlatch, ID. Theresa will help answer the question - 'Why do we all have lilacs in our yards?' and will focus on heirloom vegetable gardening.

In 2013, there will be many organizations marking the 150-year anniversary of the Idaho territory. The Idaho State Historical Society has several resources available at [www.history.idaho.gov/idaho-150](http://www.history.idaho.gov/idaho-150). Likewise, the Moscow Public Library and the University of Idaho have identified several books to read related to the Idaho territory, and have arranged a series of speakers to highlight these various books: <http://libraries.idaho.gov/files/MoscowBrchr.pdf>.

Along with this programming, the Friends of the Potlatch Library will also host the traditional reading activities for young adults to those who are young at heart. Interested people can sign up and participate at the Potlatch Public Library after the start of the New Year. A few years ago, we decided that kids shouldn't have all of the fun and so we modeled this program on the Summer Reading Program. Adults sign up to read either 10 books, 1000 pages or for 10 hours and then become eligible for prizes. Participants can read their own or outside materials. There will be incentive prizes for people who read things related to Idaho territory and history. Also, participants who complete their reading commitments will be entered into a drawing for a sizable gift certificate to a reading establishment.

## OUR SCHOOLS - February 2013

It's hard to believe that it is mid-February and the school year is over halfway completed. Many great things are happening in our schools. As a district, we are working hard at getting information on upcoming events, activities, student and program highlights and news out to you in a timely fashion. That being said, I want to let you know about Tuesday, March 12<sup>th</sup>. On that date, we will be running an election to pass our new 2013-2014 Supplemental Levy and I am asking for your support to do so. We are running this year's levy a bit earlier this year (in past years we have ran the levy in May). It allows us to set our budget, sign contracts, and plan activities and programs for the upcoming school year.

The supplemental levy has been set this year at \$1,490,000. This is an increase of \$190,000. As a taxpayer, this will mean an increase from \$6.09 per \$1,000 of assessed market value to \$6.58 per \$1,000. Once again, we are faced with the task of making up (possible) reduced State and Federal funding. With this funding reduction, it once again falls upon the school district and our local patrons to make up that loss of funds. An important note - the increase in the supplemental levy will not provide the district with anything more or new. It is just to maintain the services and programs that we currently have.

In order to inform patrons and taxpayers of what this new Supplemental Levy will cost and what it will provide for our district, a flyer/newsletter will be sent out to all patrons. This newsletter will provide information about the levy itself and how it will affect you, the taxpayer. It will also provide information on important times and dates, location of polling sites, and voting procedures. If by chance you do not receive a mailing, please be sure to contact the district office and one will be mailed to you. Community forums have been set up to allow you to come and express your support and/or concerns and ask questions, as

well as hear information about the levy from myself and our school board members. We understand that the opportunity to share and communicate openly to the community last year helped us tremendously to pass our supplemental levy this past August. We believe that it will do so again. The dates and times for the upcoming community forums and where they will be held are:

Wednesday, February 27, 6:00 p.m., Ladies Aid Hall, Harvard  
Thursday, February 28, 6:00 p.m., Nazarene Church, Princeton  
Wednesday, March 6, 6:00 p.m., Potlatch Jr.-Sr. High Gym, Potlatch

Also of importance is that on May 21st, three (3) Board Trustee positions will be up for election. Zone 1, Zone 3, and Zone 5 are the areas of the district that will require representation. If you are interested in running for one of these Board seats, please contact the district office for further information or look for application forms on our district website at [www.potlatchschools.org](http://www.potlatchschools.org).

## Potlatch Alumni Scholarship





Any teenager in grades 6 through 12 (including home-schooled) may access the center during regularly scheduled hours. Younger children are allowed when accompanied by an adult volunteer or a parent and/or guardian. A 6<sup>th</sup> grade student will be an eligible guest at the end of their 5<sup>th</sup> grade year. Adults are welcome any time that the center is open. High school students under the age of 18 are not considered appropriate guardians for younger siblings. PLEASE, NO EXCEPTION TO THIS RULE.

## **SIMPLE RULES TEENS NEED TO FOLLOW WHILE AT THE CENTER**

NO Fighting; NO Swearing; NO Bullying; NO Excessive Rough Housing; NO Back talk or disrespecting of adults or each other; NO Excessive public displays of affection; NO Abusing equipment or furniture; NO Outside food or drinks; NO Food or drinks allowed on the pool table or other games; Please pick up after yourself!

### Wellness Tips from Potlatch Family Care

## OUR SCHOOLS - May 2013

Normally in May I would be sharing with you information on our attempt to get the school's supplemental levy passed and asking for your support at the polls. You, the community, have done that already by voting our levy through in March which has allowed all of us to breathe a little easier these past few months. So, once again, I thank you! In the meantime, this allows me the opportunity to share some thoughts on what I saw this past weekend.

The state competitions not only included winning on the field or track but also behind the scenes. A gesture, smile or a few words can sometimes go a long way toward making someone's day. Our athletes showed that winning can happen anywhere. I attended the final day of the 1A State Baseball Championships, as well as the final day of the 1A State Track Championships, in Caldwell and in Middleton, respectively. I watched as our Potlatch High School Boy's Baseball team won an unprecedented third straight State Championship – a "threepeat". At the Idaho State Track Championship I was able to watch our own Jenny Sapp take 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the 300M Hurdles. Each brought home "hardware" to show off their accomplishments, such as a trophy or a medal. However, some accomplishments that occurred down in the Boise valley didn't result in a trophy or medal.

Before the final game at the State Baseball Championships, I was approached by the head coach of the Notus baseball program. Notus had been eliminated from the tournament the day before but he came back to watch Potlatch play. He had brought his son along. His son was excited to be there because he wanted to get his baseball autographed by our Loggers after they won the championship game (which he was

sure that they would do). He also wanted to see his new favorite player, Blake Andres, pitch in the final game. The coach proceeded to tell me that Blake took the time to show his son how to grip a baseball in order to throw a fastball or a curve. He didn't tell me how much time Blake spent with his son but he did say that no athletes around their school or around the area had ever taken the time to work with his son or teach him the right way to pitch. The coach and his son were instant Potlatch fans!

Later that day, while at the Track Championships, I watched Jenny Sapp run a great race. After the race, she and the other runners were moved over into the track infield. One of the runners was either injured or in some kind of pain, I couldn't tell which. While the other athletes walked on by, Jenny stayed with her and offered her some help. Although it didn't seem like much, it didn't go unnoticed. I was standing with two track coaches whom I knew and they saw exactly what I saw. Both made the statement to me that they were pleased with the sportsmanship and compassion that Jenny showed and wished they saw more of this from their student-athletes.

It's not always about who won the game or what place a person comes in during a race. Sometimes it's about the little things that make a big impact on another person's life. Our athletes were winners this weekend, in more ways than one, which made me extremely proud to be a Potlatch Logger.
